

Re: Redistricting

Dear Mr. Clegg:

I am writing this letter on behalf of the Citizens Committee for Fair Redistricting. We are a group of individuals, business owners, religious leaders, community activists primarily from the Somali and East African Community, who are interested in participating in the redrawing of the thirteen City wards which represent Minneapolis residents. We believe that the time has come for the City of Minneapolis to recognize the diversity of Minneapolis residents and it be reflected in the Ward map of the city.

According to the last federal decennial census, the City of Minneapolis has a minority population of 40%. Yet minorities are extremely underrepresented on the Minneapolis City Council. Currently, of the thirteen wards, there is only one elected official from the minority community. In a city of 382,000, there are over 150,000 minority members. If there was proportional representation on the Minneapolis City Council, five of the thirteen Wards would be represented by people from the minority population. We think this lack of representation in elected offices in Minneapolis City Hall is grossly unfair. We also find some of that underrepresentation can be attributed to the way current ward boundaries are drawn. In our view, the minority populations have been divided at the expense of the majority populations.



The Somali and East African community is composed mostly of immigrants from Somalia and East Africa. We are a hard working, family orientated, and patriotic community that has demonstrated its political cohesiveness. In the 2010 election, the Somali and East Africans became much more politically active in the DFL gubernatorial primary and the general election race. In the general election, the precincts surrounding the Cedar/Riverside community voted overwhelmingly for Governor Mark Dayton by a vote of 2,187 to 255 for Tom Emmer in these four precincts. More recently, in the 2011 Special Elections, a Somali candidate ran for the State Senate seat in District 60, generating 666 votes, or over one-third of the vote in the DFL primary. In the Senate District 59 election, the Somali and east African community came within 360 votes of succeeding to elect Mohamed Noor in the DFL primary for another State Senate seat. In both of these elections, we believe our community demonstrated their political cohesiveness and political involvement.

The Somali and East African community is centered primarily in the Cedar/Riverside neighborhood, the western Seward neighborhood, the Elliot Park neighborhood, and throughout the Phillips community. We believe that City redistricting should account for these factors. Attached you find a list of buildings, neighborhoods, businesses, and mosques located in these neighborhoods. Also, we have prepared a redistricting map to create a minority opportunity ward in the communities of Seward, Elliot Park, Cedar/Riverside, and the Phillips neighborhood. The map we have created would create a district that is regular, compact and contiguous and would comply with the requirements of the Minneapolis City Charter. We label this as Ward 2, and it would form a district which has a 40% African American or black population, a white population of 33%, an Hispanic population of 20%, and a Native American population of 7%. We believe this would create a minority opportunity ward in the near Southside. The district would also fit into a larger City redistricting population that would create regular, compact and contiguous districts throughout the City.

The map also would create two other inner-city wards. The first would be the new 6th ward, which would be comprised primarily of downtown, the Whittier neighborhood, and the western part of the Phillips neighborhood. It would also create a new 8th ward that would have a 28% Hispanic population and create a potential minority opportunity ward. It would likewise make rationale ward boundaries throughout the remainder of the City and would seek to achieve fair redistricting. A deviation from population goes

from +2.5% to -3.3%. This is within the requirements of the City Charter. The ward with the largest deviation under would be the 6th ward at slightly 1,000 under the ideal and a deviation of 3.3%. However, we would note that the 6th ward is likely the one that will grow the largest as it includes the downtown area, which is projected to be one of the highest growth areas in the City over the next decade. In truth, this new 6th Ward is probably already over populated using current estimates.



Hazel Reinhardt, the former State Demographer, is working with us as a consultant on our efforts. Ms. Reinhardt has a wealth of knowledge about population, demographic and social trends that affect communities like ours. We intend to be involved in your considerations of the Redistricting Committee and actions of the Charter Commission over the next two months and hope to have meaningful input into your decisions. We have had a chance to review various documents prepared by your Redistricting Committee and hope to work within those parameters.

We would, however, note that one of the proposed principles for your Redistricting Committee, Number 1 n raises some concerns. Currently, criteria 1 n provides as follows:

Subject to applicable law and the overriding principles of fairness and equity and in the interest of continuity, the redistricting group will change boundaries of wards or park districts as little as possible.

While we appreciate this principle, we hope that it will not be interpreted in such a way as to act merely as an incumbent protection device that would preclude our plan from being given fair and full consideration. While the population of the City of Minneapolis basically remained static between 2000 and 2010, there were dramatic changes within the demographic of the City. First, the minority population of the City increased. Secondly, because of the economic downturn, many members of our communities are renters. The stagnant economy has prevented many of our members from moving into home ownership and moving outside the boundaries of the City as economic opportunity has remained flat. The population of the City remained largely the same over the last decade, yet the City lost nearly 30,000 jobs – from 310,000 jobs to 280,000 jobs. This has made the opportunity for economic advancement much more difficult for economically disadvantaged populations. Home ownership has dropped and unemployment remains high in our community. We believe

the opportunity to have a minority elected official can, in the long term, address these problems. Also, we found that there is greater and greater concentration of members of our community.

We would ask the Charter Commission and Redistricting Committee to consider our map at the meeting on February 1st, and as you and your staff develop a future plan, consider these important demographic changes. Ms. Reinhardt would be available as a resource to your consultants and staff as they consider an appropriate, fair and equitable redistricting in the City of Minneapolis.

We look forward to working with you on this very important matter.



Dear Charter Commission,

I am writing with the hope of getting our "orphan block" reattached to a ward with our neighbors in the reapportionment process that is underway. I live on the small block between 15th and 14th Ave, 33rd street and the alley separating us from Powderhorn Park. Ten years ago we were taken out of Ward 9 and put into Ward 8. We are separated from all of the rest of Ward 8 by the park. All our neighbors are in Ward 9.

I believe a mistake was made; the folks doing the reapportionment used a map that didn't show our block as full of buildings, but rather as part of the park itself. In fact, in the first campaign after the last reapportionment, Gary's campaign didn't know and continued to distribute literature to our block which was no longer part of his ward.

This doesn't make sense. We should be in a ward with our neighbors.

The simple solution would be to put our block back in Ward 9.

Alternately our neighbors could be put in Ward 8 with us - we were in Ward 8 when we first moved to our place on 15th Ave in 1974. We should not be a half a mile from others in our ward.


I hope you received this request earlier. I have attached a pdf map of Ward 8 showing our "orphan block."

Ward 8




Our orphan block

Dear City Clerk,

In less than a month, cities across Minnesota will begin the decennial redistricting process to redraw city council lines to adjust for population shifts. It appears cities will have to go through the difficult process of redrawing lines in less than 60 days as a result of the broken redistricting process at the state level.

While this timeline creates challenges for local government across the state, we encourage you to ensure that the redistricting process is fair, transparent, and has meaningfully opportunity for citizen input. This decade, redistricting in Minnesota and across the country has faced increased scrutiny from a public who has grown distrustful of redistricting lines being drawn behind closed doors. This should come as no surprise because of the extreme examples of partisan gerrymandering that occurred in Texas and California during the last decade. While in Minnesota the redistricting process has not seen the problems that occurred in those states, there was a lawsuit and significant public scrutiny in Minneapolis because of how the process was handled.

That is why Common Cause Minnesota and League of Women Voters Minnesota have spent the last year working to reform and improve the redistricting process in Minnesota. As you move forward in the next several weeks, we urge you to adopt rules and procedures outlined below to ensure that the 2012 redistricting process is as fair and transparent as possible. These recommendations are an important step that local governments can take to help build public trust in the redistricting process. We strongly believe that community input and transparency will help line drawers develop districts that better reflect the real communities that exist. In the end, our organizations believe that these recommendations will help instill greater public confidence in the redistricting process:

- **Adopt redistricting principles at the beginning of the process.**
State law and past court decisions have outlined the redistricting principles that local government must follow. However, each local government should identify how it intends to prioritize those principles and if it intends to include any other principles during the redistricting process.
- **Provide 14 days notice before any public forums are held.**
Adequate public notice is necessary to ensure that the public can provide meaningful public input into the process.
- **Develop and maintain a public website**
The website will allow members of the public to monitor and comment on the redistricting committee's work. This website shall be fully functional and accessible by members of the general public.

- The website shall make available all demographic, political data, and other data considered by the redistricting commission.
- The website shall make available all comments received by the committee.

- **Allow for public comments to be submitted**

Facilitate public comments and public submission of redistricting proposals through regular testimony, public meetings, and the internet. At first, public testimony should be focused on helping to identify communities of interest. This is what the Minnesota special redistricting panel did to engage the community in their process. This input is valuable because community members can provide this valuable information on where different communities are located throughout the city. The goal of any redistricting plan should be to minimize dividing these communities of interest and keeping similar communities of interest grouped together.

- **Public Meetings**

Hold at least one public meetings prior to the release of the preliminary plan and at least one public meetings after the release of the preliminary plan.

- **Release a preliminary plan**

The preliminary plan should include all data and a map for public review and comment on during a two week period. Requesting this feedback is necessary to draw a map that reflects the communities that exist in your city.

We hope that you will consider these recommendations as you proceed in the next several weeks. By adopting these ideas, you can help build public trust in the process and ensure that the public has a strong voice in these important redistricting decisions.

I would like you to consider changing the lines for district 6-5 and 6-6. These precincts are long and narrow and 6-5 has not had a good voting location. 6-5 is 1.2 miles long and .2 miles wide. 6-6 is .8 miles long and .2 miles wide. I have been an election judge for many years for the area of 6-5 and the voting has occurred at the Trinity Lutheran Church and also at the Library. The individuals at both of these locations were great to work with, but the locations created logistical problems for the election judges because it was difficult to have the ballot counter away from other traffic. It is my understanding that 6-6 uses the Pentagon Building, 1415 22nd, has ample room. In the past, the meeting space at the Phillips Eye Institute, 22nd and Park, was used for voting. This was a great space and had sufficient room. If these precincts could be redivided so that the areas would be similar to .4 miles square; the result could be that the voting could then occur in the Phillips Eye Institute again and remain in the Pentagon building. This would result in more people being within walking distance to the polls, and better spaces so the legal requirements for space from the ballot box could be followed.

We believe that the time has come for the City of Minneapolis to recognize the diversity of Minneapolis residents.

We are very excited to be taking part in this important and historic moment where average citizens can voice their concerns and assert their right within the framework of our long standing Democratic ideals.

City of Minneapolis:

According to the last census, Minneapolis has a total population of 382,000, of which 150,000 are minority members this means that minority population accounts for 40%. Yet minorities are extremely underrepresented on the Minneapolis City Council. Currently, of the thirteen wards, there is only one elected official from the minority community. We think this lack of representation to elected offices in Minneapolis City Hall is grossly unfair. We also find some of that ***underrepresentation can be attributed to the way current ward boundaries are drawn.***

The East Somali American community is composed mostly of immigrants from Somalia and East Africa. We are a hard working, family orientated, and patriotic community that has demonstrated its political cohesiveness. At a time when

civic engagement is at all time low, members of the East African community in and around Cedar-Riverside area have demonstrated an unprecedented participation in voting and being actively involved in exercising their voting rights. From 2006, the Somali American votes have contributed to the election of Keith Ellison to congress. In the 2010 election, the Somali American became much more politically active in the DFL gubernatorial primary and the general election race. The precincts surrounding the Cedar- Riverside community voted overwhelmingly for Governor Mark Dayton by a vote of. More recently, in the 2011 Special Elections, a Somali candidate ran for the State Senate seat in District 60, generating 660 votes, or over one-third of the vote in that DFL primary. In the Senate District 59 election, the Somali community came within 360 votes of succeeding to elect Mohamed Noor for that district. In both of these elections, we believe the Somali Americans demonstrated their political cohesiveness and political involvement.

The City of Minneapolis has the largest Somali American population in the United States. The community is centered primarily in the Cedar-Riverside neighborhood, the Seward neighborhood, the Elliot park neighborhood and throughout the Phillips community. In a short period the community has established hundreds of small business, numerous places of worship and community organizations in this area. ***Yet the current ward boundary as they are, divides the community, dilutes its voice and prevents it from having proper representation.***

It is for these reasons we propose to you our plan,

The map we propose today would create a district that is regular, compact and contiguous and would comply with the requirements of the Minneapolis City Charter.

We label this as Ward 2, and it would form a district which has a 40% African American or black population, a white population of 33%, an Hispanic population of 18%, and a Native American population of 10%. We believe this would create a minority opportunity ward in the near Southside. The district would also fit into a

larger City redistricting population that would create regular, compact and contiguous districts throughout the City.

The map would also create two other inner-city wards. The first would be the new 6th ward, which would be comprised primarily of downtown, the Whittier neighborhood, and the western part of the Phillips neighborhood. It would also create a new 8th ward that would have a 28% Hispanic population and create a potential minority opportunity ward. It would likewise make rationale ward boundaries throughout the remainder of the City and would seek to achieve fair redistricting.

Hazel Reinhart, the former State Demographer, is working with us as a consultant on our efforts. Ms. Reinhart has a wealth of knowledge about population, demographic and social trends that affect communities like ours. We intend to be involved in your considerations of the Redistricting Committee and actions of the Charter Commission over the next two months and hope to have meaningful input into your decisions.

Dear commission, our **aims are just and fair**, the status quo is untenable. The city of Minneapolis in general & its 40% minority population in particular deserves better. It's also high time that the Somali American community's voice is heard and that its wishes are taken into account and respected. We thank you for this opportunity and ask you kindly to consider our map.
