The Fifth Annual Monarch Festival is Saturday!

The Nokomis East Neighborhood Association and the Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board are once again hosting the Minneapolis Monarch Festival at the Nokomis Naturescape, 50th St and Lake Nokomis Parkway, this Saturday, September 7. This celebration of the Monarch butterfly, its amazing migration journey, and the Monarch as a symbol of the connection between Minnesota and Mexico is unique in our city. The food, music and art of the Festival all highlight this connection.

Music & Dancing: The stage opens with Silva Sol at 10am, followed by Machinery Hill at 11am. At noon, the hugely popular Kalpulli KetzalCoatilcue Aztec Dance group will perform. The afternoon lineup starts with RAMM, and its distinctive repertoire of R&B, Rock, Funk, Motown, and Blues. The sound will become more Caribbean when Charanga Tropical takes the stage with its flute, violins, and Latin rhythm section. The day ends with Salsa del Soul's high energy Bachata, Plena and Salsa music. New this year, dance instructors will teach guests a few new dance moves on the portable dance floor, beside the stage (1:00 - 4:00).

Art & Activities: activities include printmaking by steamroller (really!) with ArtOrg and Grupo Sopa del Corazon; printing with plants; Art in the Park with the Minneapolis Institute of Arts, a variety of hands-on activities with Project Art for Nature and more.

Monarch Butterflies: The U of Minnesota's Monarch Lab has decided not to provide the Festival with Monarchs to release because of possible disease in their stock. So,



citizen volunteers collected eggs and raised the butterflies at home for the Festival. On Saturday, those Monarchs will begin their amazing 2,300 mile migration from Minnesota to the mountains of Michoacán Mexico where they will spend the winter. Monarchs will be released singly throughout the day (no mass releases) by groups of guests that have gone through a brief education and tagging exercise

Absentee Voting Begins Sept. 20

Voters who will not be able to vote at their polling place on Election Day are eligible to vote by absentee ballot. Voting absentee can be done in person at City Hall, or by mail.

Gas Line Replacement on 28th Ave Nearly Complete

After nearly four months of intense construction activity, the replacement of a large 16 inch natural gas main located under 28th Ave between 40th and 50th Streets is nearly complete. In addition to the disruption that residents and businesses along 28th Ave experienced, the rerouting of traffic has impacted residents living along Nokomis Ave and several cross streets in the area.

Throughout the project, Council Member Colvin Roy has stayed in close contact with CenterPoint Energy to ensure that every effort was being made to complete the project as quickly as possible. The recent installation of the gas main approximately 60 feet below Minnehaha Creek completed the final piece of the large-main construction part of the project (see photo). Following that, crews began installing new service lines from the main to the gas meters located on people's homes and businesses. CenterPoint doubled the number of crews to expedite completion of this phase of the project, which they anticipate to be complete by Sept. 10.

After the new service lines are installed, the old gas main will be disconnected, sidewalk panels and grassy areas that were disturbed during construction will be repaired, concrete will be poured to form a solid road base in preparation for blacktopping / paving, and the traffic barriers will be removed. It's anticipated that all of CenterPoint Energy's work will be completed by Sept. 20, after which Minneapolis Public Works will resurface the street from curb-to-curb. Since CenterPoint is done with its activity between 42nd street and 44th streets, the city is going to pave those streets beginning on September 9.

Area Residents Ask for Cooperation from Bus Riders

Some residents near this project are getting a lot more traffic than they are used to a result of the detour that's been in place all summer. City buses and school buses are running down streets that they normally would not be on and that were not designed to carry such traffic. This has been a strain, but residents have been exceedingly patient. We received a request from an area resident to help make this experience a little better as this project winds down. If you drive through the neighborhood please don't speed, and if you are waiting for a bus, please stand on the sidewalk and not in the yard. Thank you!

Park Board Storm Recovery Update

The Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board will begin removing tree stumps remaining from the June 2013 storms beginning the week of September 3. Once the stumps are removed, City of Minneapolis Public Works personnel will repair sidewalks and curbs damaged by tipped stumps at no charge to residents. All stump removal and sidewalk repairs are expected to be complete by November 1. The late June storms toppled more than 3,000 park and boulevard trees throughout the City. During the days and weeks following the storm, Park Board and City crews worked around the clock to open streets, remove downed and damaged boulevard trees and haul away residential tree debris. More than 2,300 semi truckloads of tree debris was removed from across Minneapolis between June 22 and the end of July. During the month of August, University of Minnesota researchers photographed and inventoried the addresses of nearly 800 stumps, looking for patterns that could


Volunteers Needed for Bike / Walk Counts

help foresters and arborists better understand why some trees of the same age and type fell and others did not. The researcher's documentation will also be used as part of the Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board's FEMA application process.



With the University's work nearly complete, the Park Board will work with a local contractor to extract the tipped stumps, load and haul them away, and fill the resulting hole with clean soil. Shortly after tipped stumps are safely removed, the City of Minneapolis will begin repairing damaged sidewalks and curbs.

The stump extraction does require the use of large machinery and may temporary close some streets while the work is being done. The Park Board estimates it will take four weeks to remove all of the tipped stumps.

Airport Update – Congressman Ellison Hosts Meeting

On a hot evening in August more than 400 people gathered at Washburn for the airport meeting hosted by Congressman Keith Ellison. A clear message was sent, including to the Regional FAA Representative that was present, that airport noise has a big impact on peoples' lives and that residents do not intend to be silent about proposed changes. Residents have questions and expect answers.

What was also evident is that the elected representatives of airport-affected people stand with residents and they will continue to collaborate to give a voice, and teeth, to the concerns of residents. That kind of collaboration was well-illustrated by the fact that U.S. Representatives Keith Ellison (D) and Erick Paulsen (R) shared the stage. Many legislators, including Senator Dibble and Representatives Davnie and Hornstein were present as well as Council Members Colvin Roy, Hodges, Quincy and Glidden. There were also MAC Commissioners present to listen.

The meeting was focused on the topic of RNAV, a navigation system that would result in consolidation of flight tracks. When asked at the meeting just how narrow the tracks would be, Barry Peterson of the FAA described the tracks as "a line." Last fall, the FAA sought approval to implement RNAV as MSP but citizens and elected officials objected citing too many unanswered questions and unaddressed concerns. Even though the Metropolitan Airports Commission said "no" to RNAV for now, it is expected that the FAA will be asking once again to re-visit the matter.

The purpose of Congressman Ellison's meeting was to hear questions and concerns

so that Congressman Ellison (and Rep. Paulsen) can ensure that answers to the public's questions are provided through the process if RNAV tracks are proposed again. There were not a lot of answers at the meeting, but that was expected. An important outcome of the meeting and ongoing advocacy of Rep. Ellison is to send a clear message to the FAA that we require this information, and meaningful engagement, if they want to have a discussion about RNAV. The city is in close collaboration with Rep. Ellison, who is great ally in this effort.

City Collects 894 More Tons in First Month of Citywide One Sort

Minneapolis residents have dramatically increased the amount they recycle, now that one-sort recycling has rolled out across the city. July was the first month where all Minneapolis customers had one-sort carts, and in that month there was a 57.75 percent increase in recycling compared to July of last year. That's 894 more tons of material that was recycled instead of being thrown in the trash. The increase brings the city's overall residential recycling rate up to 24.4 percent, compared to 16.4 percent before one-sort started. The City hopes to double the 2012 recycling rate by 2015 by making it easier to recycle.

One-sort recycling, where customers combine their glass, plastic, paper, aluminum and cardboard into one container when putting them out for collection, began in fall 2012 for 30,000 Minneapolis residential recycling customers. All 105,000 Minneapolis residential recycling customers had their one-sort carts by June 11 this year.

The change makes recycling a lot easier and more convenient for residents. One sort removes the need to sort recyclables and it means residents no longer need to flatten, bundle and tie cardboard with twine. The new one-sort carts provide residents with more space to collect more recycling and can be easily rolled to the curb, unlike the old multi-sort bins.

Know what NOT to put in your recycling

As folks get used to using one-sort recycling, crews have been finding some non-recyclable materials in the one-sort carts, so it's important to remember a few key things that shouldn't go into the one-sort cart. Do not include:

- Garbage.
- Yard waste.
- Plastic bags. Plastic bags get wound around the gears at the sorting facility
 and require the machinery to be shut down for several hours each day to cut
 the bags off the gears. Residents can bring their plastic bags to a
 participating grocery store for recycling.
- Expanded polystyrene foam (such as food-service polystyrene or packing bricks that come around furniture and electronics).
- Needles and syringes (sharps). These are not recyclable and pose a health risk to collection crews and sorting facility staff. Residents should place ...

household sharps in a hard plastic container with a tight sealing lid, such as a laundry detergent bottle, and write "SHARPS – DO NOT RECYCLE" on the bottle. When almost full, the bottle should be taped shut and placed in the garbage cart. Residents can also contact their doctor's office or pharmacy for other disposal options.

Also, it is important to rinse recyclables.

Residents are encouraged to keep an eye out for things they could be recycling with their new, large one-sort carts. Paper products still make up approximately 20 percent of the average Minnesotan's garbage; residents could make sure they are recycling all recyclable items including paper towel and toilet paper cores and boxes and bottles from bathroom or laundry products. Cartons of all kinds (milk, soup, juice, wine) can also be placed in the one-sort cart.

By recycling more and reducing garbage, residents can also save money each month by reducing the size of their garbage cart. Residents can request a smaller garbage cart by calling Solid Waste & Recycling at 612-673-2917.

Making products from recycled material rather than virgin material conserves natural resources and creates less waste. It also causes less pollution and uses less energy; for instance, 95 percent less energy is used to make a can from recycled aluminum than from raw materials.
