Subject: State of Minnesota (State), Department of Administration, InterTechnologies Group, C-21288, for Automated Pawn System (APS)

Recommendation: Authorize proper City officials to

- a) Extend the current contract, C-21288 for a term of three years through June 30, 2017, to provide network support and maintenance for APS
- b) Increase the current contract \$400,000 for a new not-to-exceed total of \$1,065,000
- c) Update the Terms and Conditions to reflect current standards

Financial Impact:

Yes. Funding for the contract is included in the Minneapolis Police Department existing operating budget. No additional appropriation is required.

Supporting Information:

The Minneapolis Police Department (MPD) has contract C-21288 with the State of Minnesota (State), Department of Administration, InterTechnologies Group, for the network support

and maintenance of the Automated Property System (APS). The current contract has a total value of \$665,000.

In 1996, the State enacted legislation that all pawn shop transactions be reported to local law enforcement for investigative use in stolen property cases. At that time the City of Minneapolis developed the APS, a proprietary system, as a pawn and secondhand store investigative and regulation solution.

The system was so successful in Minneapolis that it quickly became a model nationwide. APS is offered by the MPD through inter-agency agreements for use by law enforcement throughout Minnesota including agencies in western Wisconsin and eastern North Dakota, all under the Gov to Gov solutions initiative. APS is now being looked at by several jurisdictions nationally.

The current contract is used to support the APS network by over 300 law enforcement agencies throughout the State of Minnesota, Wisconsin and North Dakota, as well as the pawn stores within those jurisdictions that report their transactions into the APS database, as mandated by state laws and local ordinances. The APS system supports itself through offsetting revenues generated by the transactions and support fees used throughout the state.
