When are the elections?

Primary **September 14, 2004**

General **November 2, 2004**

Polls are open **7 a.m. to 8 p.m.**

What's on the ballot in Minneapolis?

Federal, State, Judicial,
Soil & Water offices, and 3 (of 7)
Minneapolis School Board seats

How do I register to vote?

- Register before Election Day at government offices or libraries up to 20 days before the election. Visit the Web to print a registration form or call our office for more information.
- Register on Election Day with state-approved I.D. – see list on the Web. ***Allow extra time at the polls if registering on Election Day.***

Can I vote before Election Day?

Voters can vote by absentee ballot either in person or by mail. Visit our Web site for an application and details or call our office.

Where do I vote?

Find your polling place via the Web or call our office.

Want to help ensure a smooth voting process this fall?



BEFORE Election Day:

- Pre-register to vote if you have moved or changed your name. You'll get a card in the mail notifying you where to vote.
- Help out as an Election Judge – are you bi-lingual?

ON Election Day:

- **Vote early in the day** – Minnesota law allows employees time off from work during the **morning** of the election for voting. **Don't wait until the last minute.**
- If you registered by mail and have not voted in Minnesota for federal office before, you may need to present additional identification before voting. See the Web for details.

- Need extra help at the polls because of a disability? Voters unable to enter a polling place may register and vote without leaving their vehicles.
- Need help translating information? Voters may bring an individual of their choice to help or request the assistance of the Election Judges.

And remember,

*be nice to the Election Judges—
they may be your neighbors.*
