

**Summary of the Request:** Approve the allocation of NRP Phase II Community Oriented Public Safety Initiative Reserve Funds to fund the recommended proposals in accordance with "Attachment B" attached to this report.

**Re: Community Oriented Public Safety Initiatives Reserve Fund**

Dear Chairpersons Goodman and Johnson:

At its meeting on August 18, 2003, the Policy Board dedicated a reserve fund of \$1,000,000 of Phase II funds to be committed to community oriented public safety activities. A process was developed to determine how neighborhoods would access this fund, which is to be expended by December 31, 2004. Eligibility and Selection Criteria were finally approved by the Board on February 23, 2004 and neighborhoods had until April 1, 2004 to submit proposals to use this fund. A panel of experts reviewed the proposals and made a recommendation to the Policy Board, based upon the proposals submitted, for the use of this fund.

On April 19, 2004 the Neighborhood Revitalization Policy Board approved the recommendation of the panel and authorized a total of \$999,942 to fund specific proposals for the Phase II Community Oriented Public Safety Initiatives Reserve Fund. A summary copy of the proposals, the neighborhoods requesting the funding, and the amount of funding for each proposal is attached to this report and referred to as "Attachment B".

On April 19, 2004 the Policy Board passed the following resolution:

**RESOLVED:** That the Minneapolis Neighborhood Revitalization Policy Board (Board) accepts and approves the recommendations of the review panel assessing proposals for funding from the NRP Community Oriented Public Safety (COPS) Initiatives Reserve Fund attached to this memorandum as Attachment B; and,

**RESOLVED FURTHER:** That the Board authorizes the Director to enter into the necessary contracts and agreements required to expend up to \$ 1 million of NRP Phase II funds from the NRP Community Oriented Public Safety (COPS) Initiatives Reserve Fund in accordance with Attachment B.
