New Neighborhood Funding Formula and Participation Guidelines. The Neighborhood and Community Engagement Commission (NCEC) has approved draft guidelines for a new Community Participation Program that will support and help guide the work of neighborhood organizations in 2011 and beyond. The guidelines include a funding formula which would allocate funds based on a set of 8 variables including population, income and crime statistics. In August they began the 2nd phase of the stakeholder engagement process with a 45 day review period to allow the public an opportunity to give feedback on the draft guidelines. The 45 day comment period ends Monday, October 11th at 5:00 pm. Staff and NCEC Commissioners will also facilitate a community-wide briefing session **Thursday, September 9, 6 – 8pm** at **Van Cleve Recreation Center**, 901 15th Avenue SE, and another on Thursday September 30th from 6:00 – 8:00pm at North Commons Park, 1801 James Avenue N. They anticipate presenting a final draft of the proposed neighborhood program to the Minneapolis City Council in early November.

Bicycle Master Plan. The City is seeking comments on our draft Bicycle Master Plan, which establishes goals, objectives, and benchmarks to improve safety and mobility for bicyclists and also increase the number of trips taken by bicycle. The draft plan details policies and practices around bicycling in Minneapolis, and includes an update to the 2001 Bicycle Master Plan Map. Five public meetings will be held to gather input and answer questions: **Monday, August 30**, Edison High School Auditorium, 700 22nd Ave NE, 6:30-8:30pm; **Wednesday, September 1**, Roosevelt High School Auditorium, 4029 28th Ave S, 6:30-8:30pm; **Wednesday, September 8**, Washburn High School Auditorium 201 W 49th St, 6:30-8:30pm; **Monday, September 13**, Minneapolis Central Library, Pohlad Hall Auditorium, 300 Nicollet Mall, 6:30-8:30pm and **Wednesday, September 15**, University of Minnesota Urban Research and Outreach/Engagement Center, 2001 Plymouth Ave N, 6-8pm. National Night Out. My thanks to everyone who participated in National Night Out events on August 3rd. The over 50 registered events in Ward 2 gave many of us the chance to get to know each other better and discuss issues we care about. I wish I could have attended all of them. It was a beautiful night and afforded me the chance to get to learn more about the ward and how I can serve you all better.

2011 Budget. The Mayor has presented his 2011 budget proposal to the City Council. The proposed budget increases expenses for all City funds to \$1.36 billion, an \$81 million dollar increase from 2010. The General Fund, which includes funding for the operations of most City departments, increases from \$371.6 to \$393.6 million. The budget includes an increase of 6.5% to the total property tax levy. This will bring in \$17.4 million more to cover City expenses, including a \$17.7 million jump in pension obligations. In his budget address, the mayor indicated that without these pension costs he would have proposed to lower property taxes by 0.1%. There

will \$15 million in revenue coming from a recertification of a tax increment district dedicated to neighborhood revitalization purposes and paying off the Target Center debt. The budget calls for over 80 positions to be eliminated. Many of these will likely be accomplished through attrition and not filling current vacant positions, but there will be some lay-offs. One new position, "a high-level coordinator of transit-oriented development to bring together private, public and foundation efforts around economic development on transit lines," will be added. The position will be paid for in part with foundation money. The budget also increases spending on street and other infrastructure improvements, including a new program aimed at more residential street improvements. It does count on the state following through with its \$87.5 million Local Government Aid commitment. Contingency plans may be needed if the State Government reduces this, as has happened in the past two years. The Council will have the opportunity to analyze and amend it before final approval in early December. There will be public comments taken on the levy and budget during the evenings of November 18 and at the formal Public Hearing on the budget on December 13. I welcome your comments.

Solar on Convention Center. The Public Utilities Commission has unanimously approved the City's petition to be the sole recipient of the \$2 million Renewable Development Fund Grant for a major solar installation on the Convention Center. We had shared this grant with EyeOn Energy until the Council voted to move forward on our own because the company did not have the capacity to do the project. City staff are working on an agreement with a new solar developer, and anticipate beginning the installation in this year. This is great news on an important renewable energy project that will be one of the largest solar installations in the Midwest.

Solar on Other City Buildings. The City is going to make additional investments in solar energy thanks in large part to a \$1.35 million grant from the Minnesota Department of Commerce Office of Energy Security (OES) for solar power installations on public buildings from along and near the Central LRT line Corridor within what is being called "the Energy Innovation Corridor." The locations for the Solar installations include: Fire Station #1 (240 sq. ft. thermal), Fire Station #19 (15.5 kW and 160 sq. ft. thermal with Battery Storage), the Haaf Parking Ramp (40 kW), Royalston Maintenance Facility (100 kW) 2 Solar Electric Vehicle Charging Stations on the Parking Ramp across from the Guthrie, and the Brian Coyle Center (28 kW/400 sq. ft. thermal). Once the projects are completed in the fall of 2011 the City will get 63.5 kW of solar electric power for just \$108,000. At our current electricity cost, this is a payback of less than 8 years.

Unisys Contract. The City's Business Information Services staff brought forward a proposal to extend the City's contract for information services with Unisys Corporation for four years, for a total additional cost to the City of over \$45 million. I had concerns about not conducting an analysis of alternatives, including potentially going out for open bids on this contract, exploring moving some of this work back in-house, and investigating whether open-source software can meet some of the City's needs. I was able to get my colleagues to agree to a two-week delay on this action, but unfortunately the Council majority voted to move forward with a three year contract extension on an 8-5 vote.

Digital Inclusion Fund. The Minneapolis Foundations' Digital Inclusion Fund is seeking proposals from eligible organizations in Minneapolis that are working to promote technology access and literacy. The maximum grant size is \$10,000. Preference will be given to funding requests that address program goal with special interest in proposals addressing the needs of elders and people with disabilities. Proposals must be received by 4:30 p.m. Friday, Sept. 10. Grant recipients will be notified in December 2010.

Hennepin and First. Public Works staff has completed a formal evaluation of the new configuration for Hennepin and First Avenues in downtown. The data show that the conversion to two-way and the associated bike facilities have been a tremendous success. Crashes are down,

and crashes involving cyclists are down to zero. There are more cyclists using Hennepin, First and Nicollet than were using these corridors previously. Traffic is continuing to move efficiently, while access and circulation for drivers have improved. Public Works staff also heard from the cycling community that there were some issues with the bike facilities on Hennepin and First, and have modified the design to significantly improve these facilities.

Nice Ride to Expand. The bike rental program initiated this year with City support now has over 5,000 subscribers and plans to expand in North Minneapolis. In August, a Health Department proposal was forwarded by the Public Safety and Health committee that would authorize the department to contract with Nice Ride Minnesota to expand the current "Nice Ride bike share" network into North Minneapolis. Funds of \$228,500 (including \$28,500 for a site planning process and a community engagement process, and \$200,000 for purchase and installation of new kiosks by Nice Ride Minnesota) comes through the Communities Putting Prevention to Work grant (part of the federal American Recovery and Reinvestment Act or "Stimulus Bill" of 2009). The contract period would start in September 2010 and end after implementation of bike share kiosks in North Minneapolis (no later than March 2012, the end of grant funding). The city already has an existing \$1.7 million contract with Nice Ride to complete Phase 1 of the Nice Ride project.

Hiawatha Maintenance Facility. The City has finished construction on our Hiawatha Public Works Facility, one of the greenest government buildings in the state of Minnesota. It was renovated to meet strict standards for energy efficiency and sustainability: Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) Gold level. In 2006, Council adopted LEED standards for the planning, design, construction and commissioning of municipal facilities financed by the City of Minneapolis and used by the City's Charter Departments. By adopting these standards, we are continuing and intensifying our commitment to environmentally friendly design for our buildings.

Permeable Pavement. The permeable driveway ordinance I authored has passed the Council unanimously. It will allow homeowners and others to use more types of permeable materials for driveways and parking areas, to reduce storm water runoff. I want to specifically thank Southeast Como resident Renee Szudy for bringing this issue to my attention.

Southeast Seniors Event. I will be speaking at the Southeast Seniors Annual Meeting on September 9th at 6pm. Southeast Seniors is a nonprofit, neighborhood based organization of health care professionals and neighbors helping people 65 and older remain independent and safe at home. Their service area includes Southeast Como, Prospect Park and Marcy Holmes. For more information go to www.seniorsmpls.org.

Green Building Policy. The City Council has begun the process of developing a new City Green Building Policy. In the months ahead we will convene an interdepartmental green building policy work team to be chaired by the Green Building Policy Manager and Director of Economic Development with representatives from various other relevant divisions and departments including the offices of the City Council and the Mayor. The staff and work group will consult with relevant stakeholders such as the Greater Minneapolis Chamber of Commerce, Minnesota Chapter of the US Green Building Council, Greater Minneapolis Building Owners and Managers Association (BOMA), Builders Association of the Twin Cities, Minnesota Green Communities, Xcel Energy, Centerpoint Energy, and the Center for Energy and the Environment. The work group will review best practices supporting green buildings in other communities across the country as well as current policies, procedures and practices of the City that promote green building practices and report back to Council with policy options and recommendations of how the City can further support green buildings.

TIGER II Grants. The City and County have both applied for federal (TIGER II) transportation project grants. I sent in a letter of support for the County's proposal which would construct an I-35W Northbound entrance ramp from 4th Street South and an auxiliary lane on the northbound mainline I-35W from the north end of the new I-35W bridge to the Stinson Boulevard exit and provide improvements on a wider Washington Avenue Bridge (over 35W) to improve the

pedestrian and bicyclist experience and add pedestrian enhancements to a wider reconditioned Cedar Avenue Bridge over the Washington Ave trench near the new West Bank LRT station. The City's proposal, which I also strongly support, requests funding to conduct a complete analysis of a streetcar line on the Nicollet Avenue and Central Avenue corridors.

Community Garden Resolution. I authored and presented a resolution honoring the City's many community gardeners, and declaring August 21st to be Community Gardening Day to celebrate the Parade of Community Gardens. Thanks to all the people who work to keep our community gardens going and for the great contribution they make to the city.

Small Business Energy Efficiency Event. The City, the Lake Street Council, Longfellow Business Association, the Seward Civic and Commerce Association and Xcel Energy are partnering on an energy efficiency event on **Thursday, September 2nd**, from 1-2:30PM at the Communication Workers of America Union Hall, 3521 E. Lake St. This symposium will provide no-cost, low-cost solutions to save business owners and commercial property owners money on their energy bill. The workshop will include both experts in energy efficiency audits and solutions.

Election Day Champion. As Elections Committee chair, I presented an honorary resolution to an "Election Day Champion," Mike Ostrowski. On the day of the State Primary Election last Tuesday, Mike noticed an election worker caught in a flooded intersection and came to her rescue, delivering her and the election materials she was transporting to the Elections Warehouse in his tow truck, then helped her home. He then assisted a second election worker about to enter the same intersection, returning election materials to the warehouse so that the worker could return home safely.

Elections Department Wins National Honor. Our Elections Department has been given a national award from the National Association of Election Officials, for its work to implement Ranked Choice Voting (RCV) in the city in 2009. The association presented Minneapolis with its Guardian Award, which recognizes work that exemplifies the association's code of ethics, principles, and standards for the elections profession. In presenting the award, the National Association of Election Officials noted "The enormity of the task and the level of detail it encompassed were mindboggling as they developed processes and successfully hand-counted an RCV election. This is an example of our profession at its best." Congratulations to all of our Elections staff, and especially to interim Elections Director Ginny Gelms.

New Institutional Food License. The Ordinance I sponsored that would create an "Institutional Food" license type passed through the Regulatory Energy and Environment committee in August and will be before the Council for consideration on September 3rd. The ordinance is in response to a new state law change that requires the city to license more kinds of kitchens. This license would apply to schools, child care centers, shelters and employers with cafeterias. This license will be less expensive than the existing Food Manufacturer and Restaurant licenses. If passed implementation would likely begin in spring of 2011.

Temporary Event Parking Ordinance. On Monday August 23 the Regulatory, Energy and Environment Committee held a public hearing and voted to recommend my proposed amendments to City Ordinances that would create a new category of commercial parking lot licenses to permit the issuance of temporary event parking lot licenses near the University of Minnesota Gopher football Stadium. A Class C commercial parking lot license would be available to parking lot owners for up to 15 events per year. Eligibility is limited to nonresidential properties with approved on-site accessory parking lots. This will go to the City Council for consideration on Friday September 3.

Community Energy Workshops. Community Energy Services (a program of the Center for Energy and Environment) offers free educational workshops, customized home energy visits, and 12 months of energy tracking for your home. The Community Energy Services (CES) also provides information about access to financing, specialized rebates, and tax credit information.

Welcoming New Neighbors to Ward 2. I will be helping University staff, students, neighborhood leaders, city staff and business owners greet new student renters to our community on September 1st. On the 1st and 2nd groups will door-knock student rental houses and distribute welcome bags with resource information and coupons to renters in the SE Como, Marcy-Holmes and the Prospect Park neighborhoods. I am very happy to be part of this effort to build community in the area.

Energy Loans for Larger Apartment Buildings. A city-wide, low-interest loan program to provide financing for energy efficiency upgrades is available for large multi-family residential properties in Minneapolis. The loans for structures of four stories or more containing more than 10 dwelling units are being established through the City's Department of Community Planning and Economic Development. The program is aimed at helping property owners to obtain the capital needed to make energy efficiency improvements. The loans target upgrades including boilers, water heating and distribution systems, and control systems. Water Stewardship Grants. The Mississippi Watershed Management Organization is offering more than \$200,000 in stewardship grants for organizations who want to work to improve water quality and natural resource management. Projects seeking funding should also help build community understanding initiative related to water and natural resource issues and solutions. Nonprofit organizations, officially recognized neighborhood groups, schools, local units of government, and business and professional associations are eligible to apply. Individuals, home owners associations and condominium associations, and private businesses may partner with eligible applicants in order to apply. Letters of interest are due Wed, Sept 22 by 3 pm. National Great Outdoors Discussion Comes to Ward 2. I participated in a public listening session and discussion on the President's America's Great Outdoors Initiative. Held on August 4th at Ted Mann Concert Hall in Ward 2, it provided an opportunity for Federal Government officials charged with developing and implementing the Initiative to hear from our region about solutions for building a 21st century conservation and recreation agenda. Central Corridor LRT. On August 25 the Metropolitan Council awarded the Minneapolis section (called "Civil West") construction contract to the Ames/C.S. McCrossan Team with a winning bid of \$113.8 million. This includes the "betterments" that have been funded by the U of M and the City of Minneapolis. The cost estimate for Civil West was \$126.1 million, which included the base cost of \$117 million plus \$9.1 Million in betterments. The Civil West contract includes the following main elements: building four stations: (West Bank, East Bank, Stadium Village, and Prospect Park/29th Avenue); relocating utilities necessary for the LRT trackway; constructing three miles of double track; fully reconstructing streets where track is being installed; construction of the Washington Avenue Transit Mall; strengthening the Washington Avenue Bridge by adding four trusses and replacing about 90,000 square feet of concrete deck; and work necessary for systems testing by late 2013. Also on August 25 the Met Council awarded the contract for the purchase of 31 Light Rail Vehicles (LRVs) for the Central Corridor. The contract was awarded to Siemens Transportation Systems with a bid of \$120.2 Million, which was very close to the estimate of \$119.1 Million. The LRVs will be built at the Siemens plant in Sacramento, CA.

Youth Homicides Continue to Plague City. We continue to have a tragic problem with violence in Minneapolis and with youth violence in particular. In 2010, over 40% of all homicide victims were between the ages of 10 and 24. Many of the suspects are also under 24. Twenty four of the thirty people murdered this year have been killed with handguns. Since 2006, I have been

working to get the City to do more to support sensible laws on illegal guns, and to change community values around the acceptance of guns. This includes seeking stronger penalties for people who sell and distribute illegal guns, and profit from the sale and distribution of illegal guns to young people. The City of Chicago recently responded to a recent Supreme Court decision narrowing the power of local governments regulate guns with its own new ordinance www.msnbc.msn.com/id/38061266/ns/us_news-crime_and_courts/?gt1=43001. Among other things, Chicago bans gun shops in the city; requires prospective gun owners to take a four-hour class and one-hour training at a gun range; prohibits people from owning a gun if they have been convicted of a violent crime, domestic violence or have two or more convictions for driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs; and calls for the police department to maintain a registry of every handgun owner in the city. Unfortunately, even if the entire City Council, Mayor and a majority of Minneapolis residents supported enacting similar legislation in Minneapolis we would be unable to do so: in 1985, the State Legislature took away Minneapolis' authority to regulate handguns in any way. I believe it is time for the Legislature to restore that authority and at least give us more flexibility in determining how best to register and regulate handguns in Minneapolis.

Ceasefire Application. In September the Council will learn if the City is awarded a \$2.2 million Federal grant we applied for to replicate the Chicago-based Ceasefire Program in Minneapolis. This would be one more piece of our larger effort to prevent youth violence in Minneapolis. I recognize that the program may be somewhat controversial but I am committed to work with the Health Department and the Youth Violence Prevention Executive Committee to ensure that we implement this public health approach to youth violence prevention effectively and responsibly in Minneapolis. Como Cookout. The 8th Annual Como Cookout is scheduled for **September 19th**, from 2-5pm at Van Cleve Park. The Cookout is SECIA's largest annual event. This is a great opportunity to meet your new neighbors, reconnect with old friends and enjoy a relaxed, family friendly afternoon.

Riverside Plaza. I commend the West Bank Community Coalition for working with neighborhood stakeholders to create a list of potential specific components of a development agreement for the Riverside Plaza renovation project. I am committed to working over the next few months with the Coalition, neighborhood stakeholders, the City's Community Planning and Economic Development department and Sherman Associates to help make the best possible development agreement for the neighborhood.

Riverside Reconstruction. Plans to begin the reconstruction of the one mile long Riverside Avenue between Cedar Avenue and Franklin Avenue in 2011 and 2012 are moving forward. The 2 year, \$12 million project will result in new roadway, boulevards and sidewalks. I am glad to see that the current bike lanes are preserved through the whole corridor, and that pedestrian convenience and safety will be significantly improved through numerous bump-outs and by squaring off several intersections. I commend Public Works and CPED staff for closely following

public input. Thanks to everyone who has taken the time to review and comment on the plans so far. City Council review and approval of the final design will likely be in September or October. For more, see <http://www.ci.minneapolis.mn.us/cip/riverside/>.

Prospect Park Area Road Construction meeting. Consider the significant infrastructure improvements set for this year and next, on **Tuesday August 31 from 7 to 9 pm at St. Francis Cabrini Church** (1500 Franklin Ave. SE) there will be a meeting for the Prospect Park neighborhood with representatives of the City, the County, the Met Council and MnDOT, to present information to the community on all of the construction projects that we expect over the next few years.

Tasha Holtman. Congratulations to Prospect Park resident Tasha Holtman for her Silver medal in the Junior Paper category at the National History Day competition this June. This impressive achievement speaks well of Tasha, her parents, and the Minneapolis Public Schools that she has attended, including Pratt Elementary and Sanford Middle School.

Abdi Ali. Congratulations to Abdi Ali of Minneapolis and Director of the Center for Multicultural Mediation and Restorative Justice located in Seward, for receiving a 2010 Virginia McKnight Binger Award in Human Service honoring outstanding Minnesotans. The \$10,000 awards honor Minnesota residents who give their time to improve the lives of people in their communities. Abdi was honored for his study of the causes of homelessness for Somali youth and the cultural competency of organizations working with them. In 2006, his findings led him to create the Center for Multicultural Mediation and Restorative Justice Program, combining principles of restorative justice and the indigenous values of East Africans to address the needs of Somali youth in crisis

Buffalo Wild Wings. The liquor license for the proposed restaurant that would be in the Station 19 building was moved forward without recommendation at the Regulatory, Energy and Environment Committee. I am continuing to work with the applicant and the neighborhood to craft a list of conditions that will meet both sides' needs. This license will come forward for final consideration at the September 3rd Council meeting.

Seward Solid Waste Pilot. The Seward pilot programs for both curbside organic collection and dual-stream recycling collection have been approved by Hennepin County. I look forward to seeing how these go, and hope that Seward's success can pave the way for more composting and recycling citywide.

Dania Lot. The People's Center has withdrawn its proposal to develop new clinic with retail space on Cedar Avenue at the former site of Dania Hall. The financial challenges involved were noted as the primary reason. Now the city and community will have to regroup and rethink next steps related to the reuse of this prime piece of city-owned property on Cedar Avenue.

U Provides Funds for Police Near Campus. In September the City Council will likely formally accept \$60,000 from the University to provide enhanced police enforcement in neighborhoods around U and \$14,200 to provide security the Gopher Football Stadium.

Openings on Boards and Commissions. The City has developed a new streamlined appointment process that we hope will make it easier for people to learn about and consider applying to serve on one of the more than 50 volunteer-based boards, commissions and advisory committees that advise the City on issues and help with policy development and administration of services. This should also ensure a more open and understandable process for residents and staff, and increase the diversity of the applicant pool. Previously, appointments were made on an as-needed basis throughout the year. Now, appointments to board and commissions will be made twice a year — in the spring and fall. The City is seeking applicants with a diversity of backgrounds and experiences to strengthen the work of the City. There are 112 open positions on 14 City boards/commission. Applications will be reviewed beginning October 4th, 2010,

however the positions are open until filled.
