**Background/Supporting Information Attached**

As part of a large federal lead remediation grant, Hennepin County is subcontracting with the Department to provide a portion of the grant activities related to conducting education and outreach around lead poisoning prevention strategies. The goal is to educate and recruit landlords, tenants, and homeowners to enroll in the Hennepin County Works and Transit (HCWT) Lead Grant Program, particularly targeting North Minneapolis. This collaboration will also focus on devising strategies to screen uninsured children for lead and provide their families with the follow up support and services needed. Additionally, this project seeks to further the MDHFS' efforts in promoting awareness around lead and lead poisoning to families with children with blood lead levels between 5-9 micrograms per deciliter.
