**Background/Supporting Information**

Minneapolis has long been a leader in solid waste management activities and has piloted innovative programs that have anticipated regulatory mandates and which have resulted in outstanding services to our customers and positive environmental benefits. Minneapolis has, therefore, been able to develop operational methods that are cost-effective and convenient for

our customers, and which seamlessly integrate regulatory mandates into our solid wastes management system.

Hennepin County is redesigning their solid waste management programs. One aspect of that redesign is consideration of mandating the manner of recyclables collection that cities provide, instead of only mandating the recyclables that cities collect. Dual stream recyclables collection, in which one bin or cart is filled with aluminum, glass or plastic containers and another bin or cart is filled with fiber (paper and cardboard) recyclables, is one system that Hennepin County strongly favors.

The Seward Neighborhood Association approached the City with a proposal to use approximately 700 homes in the Seward Neighborhood be included in a pilot program to test dual stream recyclables collection in Minneapolis. Public Works supported this concept and a grant proposal was drafted for a Hennepin County Waste Abatement Incentive Fund grant. Before and after tonnage, participation (setout and long-term participation) and contamination rates will be evaluated through route data collection and garbage and recyclables sorts. Efficiency of routing, additional costs of recyclables processing and return of revenue to the City from the marketed recyclables will be tracked and compared to the existing recyclables collection and marketing programs. Hennepin County is very interested in this opportunity to obtain valid data on a change to a stable recycling program that will document operational, customer and end-result comparisons between the existing program and a changed program. Hennepin County has approved this project.

It is requested that the Council authorize appropriate City staff to accept the Hennepin County grant to support this pilot program. The total grant is up to \$100,000. Funds to match the grant and complete the program are estimated at less than \$30,000, and are available in the Solid Waste and Recycling Enterprise fund.
