The APS Automated Pawn System® file servers and related hardware have been housed, maintained and monitored by the State of Minnesota, Department of Technology, Inter-Technologies group since November, 2000 under a contract for services between the City and the State. This request is for authority to negotiate and enter into a new service agreement with the State for continued housing, maintenance and support of the APS Automated Pawn System hardware, and network management.

Background/Supporting Information Attached

The APS Automated Pawn System was developed and implemented by the City of Minneapolis in 1997 to facilitate the electronic collection, maintenance and sharing of pawn shop transaction information among multiple jurisdictions. It is supported by users' fees paid by the more than 70 jurisdictions/agencies currently connected to it.

APS member agencies access the system via the State's Criminal Justice Data Network (CJDN). In order to maintain data privacy, minimize network connections and stabilize access to the APS Automated Pawn System, the file servers are located at the State. For the past 30 months, the State, under contract with the City, has provided conditioned housing facilities, network administration, hardware/system monitoring and upgrades, and has facilitated access to new users via the CJDN. Approval of this budgeted request will insure continued support and growth of the APS Automated Pawn System.
