## ***Heart of the City***

**212 17th Avenue N**

**Caprice Glaser, 2005**

This work is inspired by the shape of the City, the Mississippi and the Chain of Lakes. The animal tag expresses the mission of Animal Care and Control to ensure animal safety, while the heart image conveys the meaning animals bring into our lives.

## ***Turning Leaves***

**1315 Lowry Avenue N**

Three whimsical leaf-shaped, wooden benches beckon visitors into the library. Turning Leaves is a play on words, as the benches appear to have floated down from the sky and gently landed on the ground. The artist also designed tile floor leaf pattern.

## ***Heritage Park Public Art***

**Various locations in Heritage Park**

**Seitu Jones, TBD**

Artworks integrated into plazas and trails draw on environmental, cultural, and historical themes. They recall the Sumner Field Homes and wildlife once found in Bassetts Creek, reminding residents of the forces that led to the creation of Heritage Park.

## ***Hawthorne Gateway: Circle of Vision***

This interactive artwork is based on a tower which formerly stood on Farview Park's hill. Periscopes offer views of the Downtown skyline, historic photos and futuristic children's drawings. Large animals, including a cardinal and buck, adorn the columns.

## ***Harrison Gateway: Antoinette and James***

**Olson Memorial Highway and Penn Avenue N**

Two bronze children bear bronze banners atop columns, welcoming people to the neighborhood. Colorful steel tiles on the column bases include portraits and symbols designed by the community.

## *Camden Gateway*

This 700-foot sculpture park features stone and metal sculptures, seating, and a flowing landscape of berms and plantings. Seven rocks in the signature sculpture, Saturn, represent the nearby neighborhoods. The Camden Garden Club maintains the gardens.
