

Ward 4

Context

Ward 4 is the northernmost ward in the city and is home to a number of residential neighborhoods, parks and important community corridors. Major landmarks include the Victory Memorial Parkway, Crystal Lake Cemetery and the Humboldt Industrial Yards.

Ward 4 is currently represented on the City Council by **Barbara Johnson** who also serves as council president. She was first elected in 1997.




Open streets initiatives temporarily close streets to automobile traffic, so that people may use them for walking, bicycling, dancing, playing, and socializing.

With more than 100 documented initiatives in North America, open streets are increasingly common in cities seeking innovative ways to achieve environmental, social, economic, and public health goals.

In 2014 Minneapolis hosted 6 open streets events including one on the Lowry Avenue N corridor. The Lowry Avenue N corridor was recently completely reconstructed in partnership with Hennepin County and has undergone a community planning process to envision its future as an important community and commercial corridor for North Minneapolis and Ward 4.

Ward 4

Context



Ward 4 is the northernmost ward in the city and is bordered to the West by Robbinsdale and Golden Valley, to North by Brooklyn Center and the East by the Mississippi River and Northeast Minneapolis. The ward is largely defined by its residential neighborhoods and its combined industrial and recreational riverfront. Victory Memorial Parkway and Theodore Wirth Parkway provide a significant green buffer along the ward's northern and western edges.





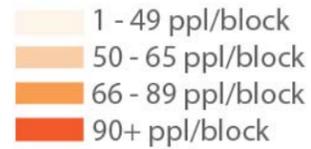

Average Household Size per Census Block




Total Population per Census Block

Population: Average Population by Census Block (Minneapolis)







Owner Occupied Units as a Percent of Total Units Per Census Block




Housing: Vacant vs. Occupied (Minneapolis)

Victory Memorial Parkway


Victory Memorial Parkway travels north from Theodore Wirth Parkway and Lowry Ave. to 45th Ave. N then east to Humboldt Ave. N and the entrance to Webber Park.

The 2.8 mile parkway was established as a monument to the bravery and sacrifices of people from Hennepin County who lost their lives in World War I. It is lined by stately hackberry and elm trees planted for each of the 568 Hennepin County veterans who died. Markers are installed with the name, rank and company of each veteran. A memorial wall lists the names of the fallen military personnel, and gardens are planted near the plaza. There is also a statue of Abraham Lincoln found at Grand Army of the Republic Plaza. Victory Memorial Parkway is a park of the Grand Rounds Scenic Byway.


Various improvements have taken place over time including the installation of the bicycle path (trail) in 1975. When the Metropolitan Council regional park system was created in 1974, the parkway along with other major parks in Minneapolis became part of the regional system. In 2003, the Minnesota Legislature passed a bill designating "Victory Memorial Drive" as a state historic district.


Race + Ethnicity



People Identifying as Hispanic or Latino as a Percent of Total Units Per Census Block





People Identifying as Black or African American Only as a Percent of Total Units Per Census Block





Race and Ethnicity (Minneapolis)




Race and Ethnicity (Ward 4)




People Identifying as American Indian or Alaska Native Only as a Percent of Total Units Per Census Block




People Identifying as Two or More Races as a Count Per Census Block

Upper Harbor Terminal

*The **Upper Harbor Terminal (UHT)** is a 50-acre industrial property located approximately 2 miles from downtown Minneapolis along the west bank of the Mississippi River, between Lowry Avenue and the Camden Bridge in North Minneapolis.*

Declining business and the move to reduce the threat of invasive Asian Carp migrating into the upper waters of the Mississippi have led to the Water Resources Reform and Development Act of 2014, signed by President Obama in June of 2014, ordering the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to close the Upper Saint Anthony Falls Lock within a year. The closure of barge business above Saint Anthony Falls provides an opportunity for the City to shape a new vision for the Upper Harbor Terminal.

A recent redevelopment study undertaken by the City of Minneapolis Community Planning and Economic Development department has analyzed a new vision for the site that includes an urban business park with the possibility of housing and a public riverfront park destination.


Age

Population Age 65+ as a Percent of Total Units Per Census Block








Lowry Ave Bridge

The Lowry Avenue Bridge is a steel tied-arch bridge over the Mississippi River in Minneapolis, Minnesota, completed in October of 2012 and constructed by Hennepin County in partnership with the City of Minneapolis. The bridge was built to replace the original steel truss bridge that was discovered to have structural deficiencies. That bridge was closed in 2008 and the new bridge opened to the public on 10/27/2012 at a cost of 104 million dollars.


The bridge has a high-tech design that includes an anti-icing system, and an underground sand filter to filter stormwater as it flows off the bridge and from surrounding areas. At night the bridge is illuminated with dynamic LED lighting. After just two years of use it has become an important landmark and a reinforcing connection on the Northside of Minneapolis and for Ward 4.


Employment

Employment as a Percentage of Civil Labor Force (Minneapolis)




Employment as a Percentage of Civil Labor Force (Ward 4)







Reported Educational Attainment (Ward 4)






Upper Harbor Terminal

The Upper Harbor Terminal (UHT) is a 48-acre site located along the west bank of the Mississippi River between Lowry Avenue North and the Camden Bridge. It is currently used for industrial purposes including bulk storage and uses related to the Port of Minneapolis. The closing of the UHT facilities provides a major opportunity for redevelopment of the site. The goal is an innovative job-intensive development, addition of new parkland along the river, the creation of a destination for the entire City and region, and access to jobs and parks for residents of North Minneapolis. The City recently completed a study that evaluated development potential and balancing the need to provide parkland and a parkway through the site. The City is currently working through implementation steps, short-term and long-term, to implement the goals for the area.



Lowry Avenue Corridor

The Lowry Avenue corridor in North Minneapolis stretches from Victory Memorial Parkway at the west end to the Mississippi River at the east end. The road was reconstructed in 2006 and the City adopted the Lowry Avenue Strategic Plan in 2010. The plan promoted improvements to businesses, housing, and transportation along the corridor. Several vacant properties, many owned by the City or County, along the corridor and at key intersections, provide opportunities to implement this vision. The corridor is also part of a Hennepin County Community Works project, which provides opportunities for City-County partnerships in implementing the vision.



Penn Avenue

Penn Avenue is currently part of a Hennepin County Community Works project, a small area planning process, and the future route of the C Line Arterial Bus Rapid Transit service. These projects all provide a significant opportunity to implement a vision of improved housing, commercial activity, and transit for the residents of North Minneapolis. These opportunities are corridor wide, and tie together specific key intersections, such as Penn-44th, Penn-Lowry, Penn-West Broadway, Penn-Plymouth, and Penn-Glenwood, as well as connecting the northside to the Penn Bottineau LRT station at Hwy 55 and Penn Southwest LRT Station just south of I-394.



Capital Improvement Plan*

The City of Minneapolis Capital Improvement Plan is the 5-year strategic investment plan for infrastructure improvements. It includes projects ranging from traffic and safety improvements to street lighting updates to repaving and complete street reconstruction.

Recent and upcoming investments for Ward 4 include repaving of Dowling Ave N and 42nd Ave N, high-volume resurfacing of Lyndale Ave N and Bryant Ave N and regularly scheduled pavement maintenance in the Folwell and McKinley neighborhoods.

Land Use Features*

Ward 4 is largely composed of Urban Neighborhood land use, including mostly single family residential neighborhoods. Also prominent is the large industrial use in the Humboldt Industrial Area. Future land use guidance calls for several parks along the Mississippi as well as around Shingle Creek. Crystal Lake Cemetery occupies a large swath of land at the center of Ward 4, and Victory Memorial Parkway makes up the ward's Western border.






