1. How have your life/work/cultural experiences prepared you to be a neighborhood representative on the NCEC?

I am a Salvadorian/Latino immigrant that moved to Minneapolis in 1990. A few years later, in 1993, I became a home owner of my current property located in Longfellow Neighborhood. My two children born in Florida and Minneapolis now in college & University attended Minneapolis public school since pre-school.

For the past 23 years I have seen the increasing number of Latino-immigrants changing the face of this beautiful City. Like any other immigrant group, Latinos encounter a range of issues that prevent them from becoming fully integrated into the mainstream society. I think neighborhood associations are key City assets that could support that integration process a little quicker and effectible.

2. How have you participated in your neighborhood organization?

I became a board member for as short period of time when Longfellow association used to have the people of color designated seats. There were a few issues that prevented me from continuing my membership, among other things, I couldn't understand at that time the impact of my participation by attending meetings. However, my current job as a director of a community center has helped me to develop perspective and tools for impacting communities. I would like to learn from others and share my knowledge, so we keep working on building an inclusive Minneapolis.

3. Describe why you want to serve on the NCEC.

As stated above, my current position as Director of Waite House Center has gave the knowledge base to understand neighborhood associations and ideas for impacting communities. My desire for joining NCEC goes with the plan of developing new leaders that eventually, if elected, will replace me after serving one or a maximum of two terms.

4. If elected, how do you plan to maintain a relationship with the neighborhoods you would represent?

I'll start attending neighborhood meetings and make myself available to support their work.

5. How do you plan to engage with under-represented groups within your district?

Coming from an under-represented community, that according to the 2010 US-Census Latinos make up 10.5% of Minneapolis's population, I plan to implement, as resources allows it, 2+ listening sessions with Latinos to get their ideas for building an inclusive Minneapolis. Also support other NCEC members to achieve their engagement goal.
