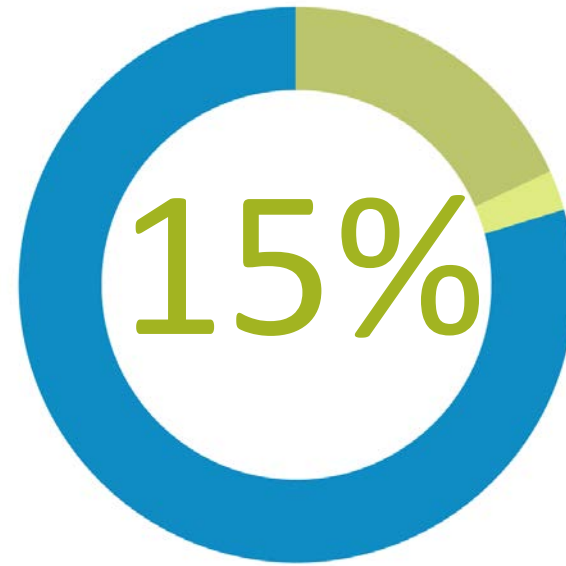

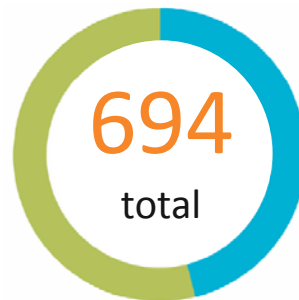

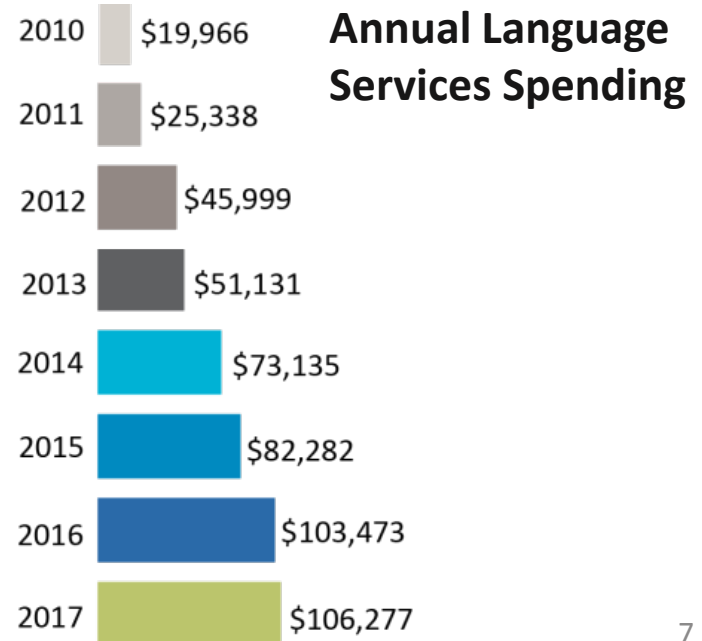
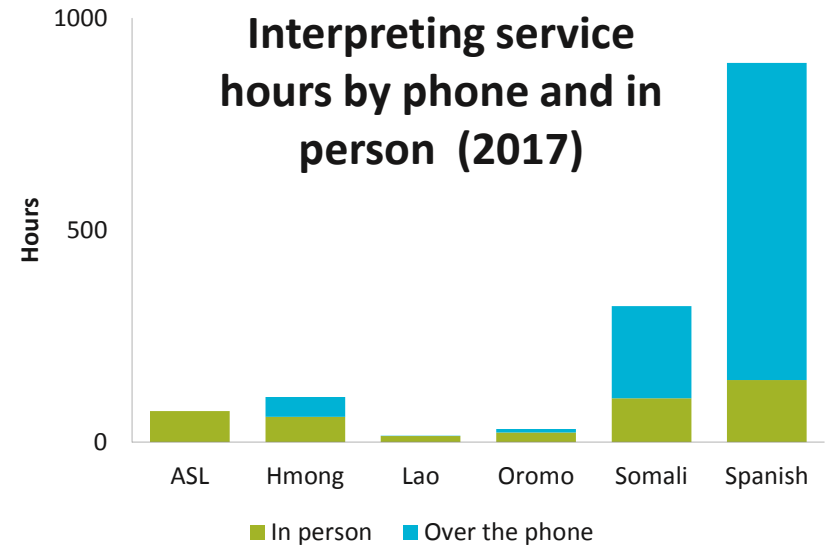

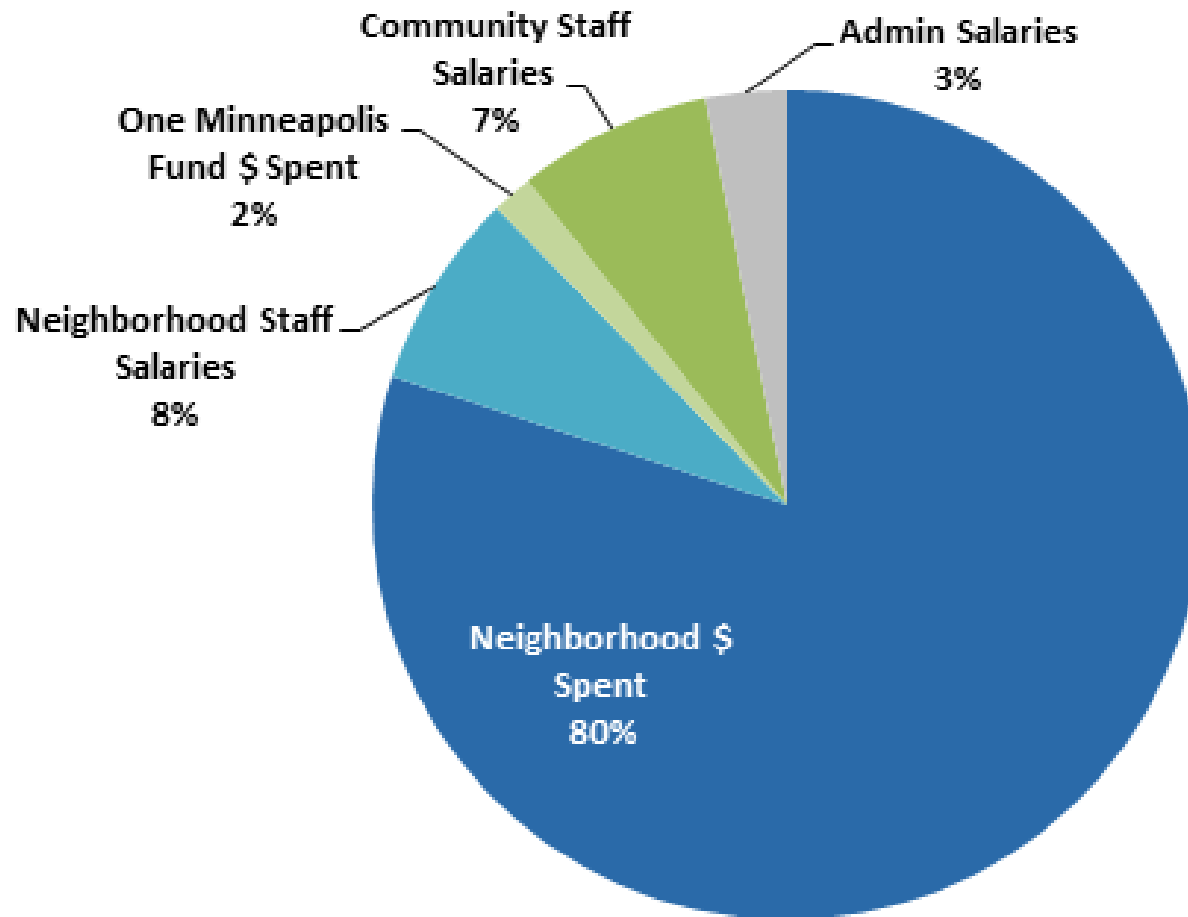

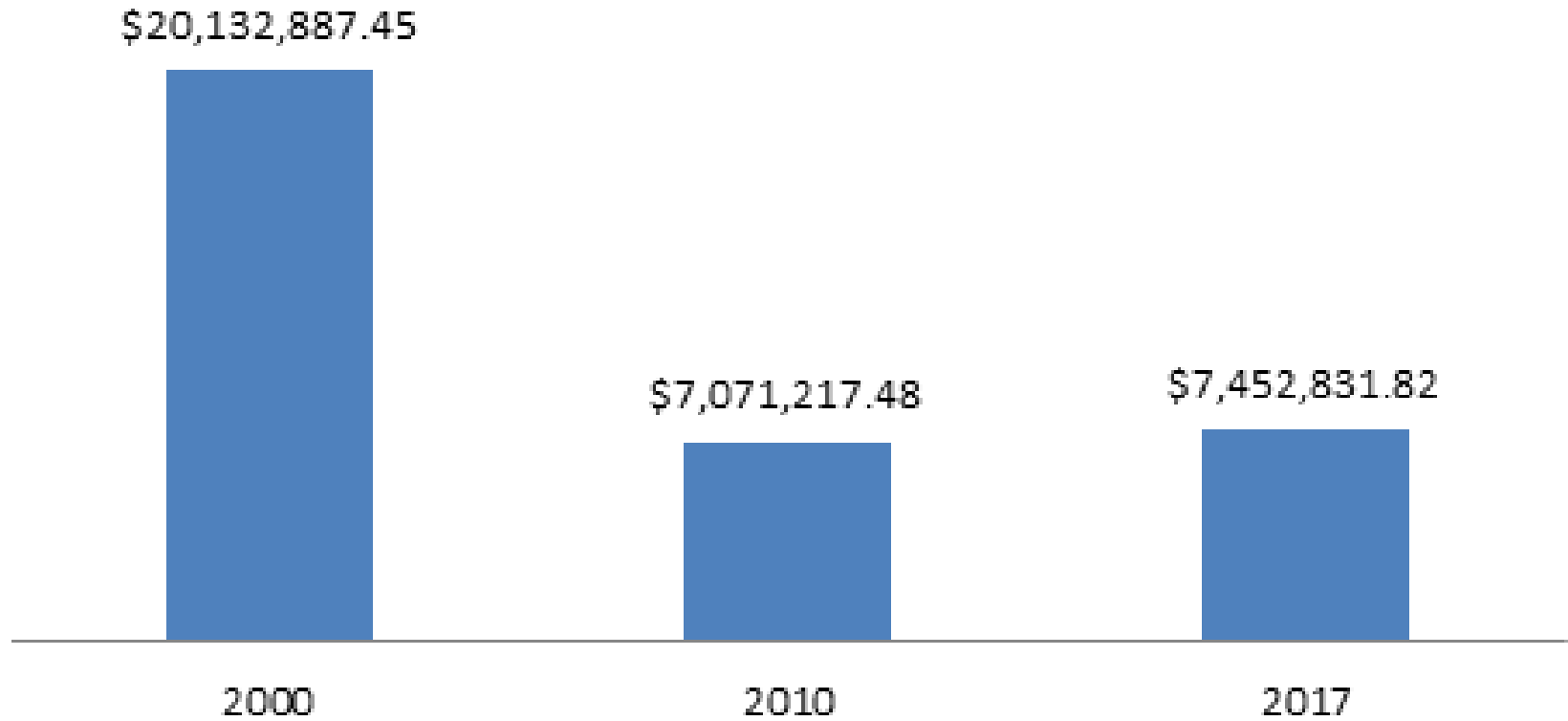
NCR Budget
