## Organics Study Released

Minneapolis Solid Waste & Recycling began its first organics collection pilot in 2008. Since then, two additional pilot areas have been established.

A study of collection methods, associated costs and environmental impacts of a city-wide organics program was conducted by a consultant in 2013. The study was presented to the Transportation & Public Works Committee on October 8, 2013.

The report signifies that city-wide organics will happen once several barriers are overcome and it is feasible for a roll-out to be completed.

The Recycling Association of Minnesota launches their Recycle Your Holidays™ program each year on America Recycles Day. The Recycle Your Holidays™ program collects unwanted holiday lights for recycling from November 15th through the end of January each year.

With over 500 drop-off locations state-wide, there's a place conveniently located for you to drop-off those unwanted working or non-working lights.



The October 15th session of Results Minneapolis overviews the current status of solid waste and recycling collected and reiterates why the City moved toward a one-sort recycling program. The study also evaluates the first year of the mattress recycling program and provides an update on metal items collected. The graph on the right shows tonnage from 2012, annualized tonnage for 2013 and a 2017 target. The [report](#) details that overall the one-sort program has resulted in an average 50% increase in weight of materials collected through August 2013. The 2017 projection assumes a city-wide organics collection program will be in place. See the [full report](#) for more details on how we're doing.

## Why is there a litter container there, but not here?




Litter containers can be placed wherever they may be needed. The question is who will empty it when it gets full, or pay for the City to provide this service. The City of Minneapolis has concrete and plastic litter containers placed throughout the city. The Division of Solid Waste and Recycling and the Division of Traffic and Parking Services partner to provide and pay for regular service of containers located at Bus Stops within Commercial Corridors and at all bus shelters city-wide. Litter containers within [Special Service Districts \(SSD\)](#) are placed at the direction of the SSD board; the costs to service these containers are paid for by members of the District. All other litter containers are adopted. Adopters choose where the container is needed and select whether to provide service themselves, at no charge - bags and gloves provided - or pay the City for pickup. Know of a bus shelter without a litter container? Let us know!

## Graffiti Doesn't Stop When it's Cold

Property owners are generally required to remove graffiti within 7 days; however, the cold weather can affect the removal process. Under a deadline? Weather not cooperating? Consider calling our office to request an extension by dialing 612-673-2090. Even though the weather is cold, it is still important to report the graffiti as soon as you see it. City crews and contractors have experience with removal of graffiti on many surface types and can remove most graffiti during the temperatures and conditions that the winter season brings.



### General Abatement Guidelines:

Acrylic Paint	32 Degrees or warmer
Enamel Paint	22 degrees or warmer
Latex Paint	50 Degrees or warmer *
<a href="#">Fire Station Solvent</a>	17 degrees or warmer
Other Caustic Solvents	Any Temperature
Pressure Washer	32 Degrees or warmer due to icing
Sand Blasting	Any Temperature, surface type dependent

## Keep Your Carts Clean, Inside & Out

A smelly cart is more likely to attract unwanted animals and flies. Strong odors appeal to squirrels and raccoons; that will chew through the plastic sides or lid damaging the cart. Put a little dish soap in the cart, put the cart on its side, turn on the hose, and spray out the dirt. Adding baking soda or vinegar to the soapy solution will greatly cut down on smells. Keep it clean by bagging all garbage and keeping the lid tightly closed. Graffiti damaged carts can invite more graffiti and its generally simple to remove. Supplies to keep your carts graffiti-free are available, at no charge, by calling 612-673-2789.

Consider giving your loved one a more meaningful, less costly gift this holiday season. Give your significant other, your children, friends, or other family members coupons for different activities or favors. Customize your coupons for the recipient. Some examples include:

### Coupons to give to an Adult:

### Wrapping Paper:

Instead of buying expensive, potentially non-recyclable wrapping paper, get creative with your gift wrapping this year.



Use items you have that are unique to the person the gift is for. For example, wrap a child's present in the newspaper comic pages, or wrap an adult's gift in an old map. Have kids wrap presents in a brown paper grocery bag and decorate the outside.

Other items that make for great unique wrapping paper include:

- Old calendars or posters
- Sheet music


**Extra Recycling?** If you have extra recycling this holiday season that won't fit in your one-sort recycling cart, please set it out in a cardboard box or in paper grocery bags placed next to your cart on your recycling day. Please remember that **plastic bags are NOT accepted for recycling**. Recyclable gift wrapping paper (that without a lot of glitter or reflective areas) should be placed inside your recycling cart, in a cardboard box or inside paper bags for it to be picked up.

If you consistently have extra recycling, call Solid Waste & Recycling and ask for another cart!

**Reminder:** Do NOT place extra recycling out in your old blue or green multi-sort recycling bin.

If you do, City crews will take the bin and it will not be returned.





## End of Yard Waste Season

Solid Waste & Recycling has extended the yard waste season through the week of November 25th, 2013. If you have yard waste following the City's last collection, you will need to bring it to a yard waste facility or store it until next Spring. Call Solid Waste & Recycling at (612) 673-2917 and our Customer Service staff will assist you in finding a place to bring your yard waste.

## Holiday Collection Reminder!

The following holidays will affect your solid waste and recycling collection:

**Thanksgiving**                      **Christmas**                      **New Years**

If your garbage day falls on, or follows one of the holidays listed above, your garbage and recycling will be picked up one day later than usual.

Sign up to receive Recycling Reminders and Holiday Collection Reminders by clicking [Find My Garbage Day](#) or [Find My Recycling Day](#) on under the Garbage or Recycling section of Solid Waste & Recycling website. Enter in your address and click *Subscribe to email updates and reminders*.

The day before your scheduled recycling collection, you will receive an email reminding you to set out your recycling the following day. You will also receive email notification on holiday weeks letting you know if collection will be delayed.



## Snow Shoveling Reminder

To effectively service carts this winter, please remember to shovel around your garbage and recycling carts so they are

easily accessible by City crews. It is City ordinance and if you fail to shovel and it has not snowed within 48 hours of your collection, City crews will shovel the cart(s) out for you and a \$30 per cart fee will be added to your City utility bill.

Garbage collection crews empty an average of 800 to 900 carts per two-man crew. That's an average of 17 tons collected by two people each day! Please give them a break by shoveling out your carts and reporting damaged wheels or lids promptly for repair. Broken wheels make the cart more difficult to move, especially when full. Damaged lids are not as effective in keeping water out, causing the cart to quickly become overweight.

## Cardboard Cans are Now Recyclable!



Cardboard cans are now accepted in the one-sort recycling program. Cardboard cans have a steel bottom, boxboard sides, and typically a plastic lid. Examples include: chips, nuts and other snacks, frozen juice, powdered baby formula, drink mixes, cleaning products, and refrigerated dough.
