






City demands massive mobilization to address climate change

Engagement Activities

Focus Groups

- Small group discussions (5-10 community stakeholders) that occur every 2-3 months with the project team.
- Groups will provide their various perspectives about the 38th and Chicago Re-Envisioned project.
- Project team will use the information to further inform the project approach and potential intersection/area design ideas.





Engagement Activities

Community Co-Creation Team (CCT)

- Composed of community stakeholders (homeowners, renters, faith leaders, community leaders, business and property owners) who all live/work in the area.
- Meet monthly throughout project.
- Review project approach, information from engagement activities, design concepts and other relevant information and provide feedback.
- CCT members will review design concepts as they are developed with the goal of recommending a preferred final concept to the project team.
