New Public Service Building

- Co-locates employees and services from several locations in downtown.
- At 501 Fourth Avenue South.
- Serves employees, service center clients, nearby neighbors and the City's diverse residents.
- Construction-fall of 2018,
 Complete-summer 2020,
 Open to the public-fall 2020.
- Design team: MSR (Meyer, Scherer & Rockcastle) and the international firm Henning Larsen.



New Public Service Building PUBLIC ART GOALS

- Create a public space that is inviting, pleasant and compelling for visiting businesses and residents.
- Reflect the culture and diversity of the city through history and storytelling.
- Reflect the mission of public service, the City's commitment to transparency and educate the public about the City services.
- Support a work environment that promotes wellness, a diversity of work styles, collaboration and innovation.



New Public Service Building PUBLIC ART GOALS

- Be thoughtfully integrated into the architectural identity and design, materials, and palette.
- Be contemporary, yet timelessly elegant, and meaningful.
- Enhance the focal points, entrances, plazas and wayfinding systems.
- Celebrate the sustainability goals of this project and the facility.
- Be durable and maintainable.



New Public Service Building PUBLIC ART PHASE ONE

- Artist Tristan Al-Haddad (Formations Studio) selected.
- To identify public art
 opportunities within the
 building.
- To design and fabricate a signature piece (atrium).
- Has identified over 30 possible opportunities.



New Public Service Building Excerpts and Votes 4.18.18 Community Meeting

Atrium/26 Dots:

- Do not crowd, confound or block light.
- Something memorable like Father of Waters or the Spoon Bridge and Cherry.

Luminous Ceilings/20 Dots

Do not crowd, confound or block light.

Mural Glass/19 Dots

 Depiction of historic events and people can become dated.

Glass Frit/18 Dots:

 Use to expand on the natural streetscape.

Least Votes: Door Pulls/1 dot



- Artist to design patterning for portions of the bird-safe glass frit.
- Locations have not been finalized.
- Deadline: August 3


New Public Service Building BIRD SAFE GLASS DESIGN National Call

- Be a sophisticated, timeless for 75-Year civic building.
- Be an abstract geometric pattern.
- Use a white frit.
- Complement interior and exterior design
- Integrate with the frit for the rest of the building.



New Public Service Building BIRD SAFE GLASS DESIGN National Call

- Read from a distance and up close, create a play of light and shadow on the interior spaces.
- Be successful as the light changes throughout the day.
- Meet stated criteria in terms of transparency and percentage of area covered by the pattern.




Upcoming Opportunities NARRATIVE MURALS ON GLASS Local Call

- Narrative in nature.
- Portions could repeat on the hallway glass, in lieu of standard pattern.
- Needs include translucent, opaque and open spaces; avoid a sense of claustrophobia.
- Should complement interior and core ceiling designs.


Upcoming Opportunities LUMINOUS CEILINGS Local Call

- Abstract in nature.
- Lit from above.
- Could be in natural materials, as well as others.
- Attaches to base framework.
- Size, weight and height constraints.
- Should complement interior and core ceiling designs.




Upcoming Opportunities HAND RAIL AND DRINKING FOUNTAINS Local Call

- Opportunity to engage local craftspeople.
- Should complement interior designs and materials.
- Needs to be in a material that is durable given continuous handling
- Should comply with all codes.



Upcoming Opportunities MEDIA WORKS Local Call

- Commissions by local artists to create short media works.
- To be projected on a display system in the Public Service Center.
- Should be appropriate to users who are waiting, and may visit on an ongoing basis.







New Public Service Building ATRIUM ARTWORK


Tristan Al-Haddad

Expresses the climatic conditions of the city through continuous movement and change to be experienced and contemplated over time.

- Suspended within the two story atrium (material and color to be determined)
- Large ephemeral vaulted form within the two-story atrium.
- Connects to the design's focus on the Minneapolis natural environment (stone, lakes, tree canopy and sky.)


New Public Service Building ATRIUM ARTWORK

New Public Service Building ATRIUM ARTWORK Linkage to Real-time Information


- Linked to real-time
 information (collected on
 the roof) and conditions
 related to the Minneapolis
 sky (such as temperature,
 color, humidity, and
 particulate/pollution.)
- Will register in changes in the movement of the work, mapping daily, seasonal and annual cycles, and perhaps even time frames across decades.



New Public Service Building ATRIUM ARTWORK

Connection to Workers and Citizens


- The environment and its resources are a key concern of the citizens of the City, and will continue to be.
- They are also the focus of the work of many of the people in the building.
- The City's draft comprehensive plan currently calls for and 80% reduction in greenhouse gas emissions by 2050.



New Public Service Building ATRIUM ARTWORK

Viewer's Experience

- Abstract, but accessible to a broad range of people from diverse cultural backgrounds.
- Could be experienced and contemplated overtime.
- Draws awareness to our collective role as stewards of the environment.


Public Service Area (PSA)






1 View of service counters

2 View of entry from skyway


