BIRTH CONTROL IS A SAFE WAY TO PREVENT

PREGNANCY

The risks of any birth control are less than the risks of pregnancy.

Choose which method works best for you.

There are possible side effects with all birth control, just like any medication.

Come back to the clinic if you experience signs of pregnancy, change in vaginal discharge, abdominal or pelvic pain, possible exposure to an STI, painful sex, bleeding after sex, headaches, mood changes, or severe pain in your chest, abdomen, or legs.

HOW IT WORKS

Ella is an Emergency Contraception pill that someone with a uterus can take **after** having unprotected sex, within the first 5 days (120 hours). Ella works to prevent pregnancy by stopping the ovaries from releasing an egg.

Emergency Contraception is used in an emergency only, so it's important that you have a regular method of birth control.

Reasons to use Ella can include:

- You are not on birth control and had unprotected vaginal sex (sex without a condom)
- A condom broke, slipped or came off during vaginal sex
- You are on birth control but forgot to take your medication and you had unprotected vaginal sex
- You had unprotected vaginal sex within the first 7 days after starting birth control

EFFECTIVENESS

- Ella is 85% effective when taken within 5 days (120 hours) after unprotected vaginal sex. It is equally effective throughout the 5 days.
- Ella is most effective for people who weigh 195 pounds or less.
- Ella is not effective if you had unprotected vaginal sex more than 120 hours before taking it or if you are already pregnant. Ella is not an abortion pill.

POSSIBLE SIDE EFFECTS

After using Ella, your next period may be late. You may also have spotting (light bleeding), nausea, abdominal pain, tiredness or a headache.

If you do not get a period within 3 weeks of taking Ella, see your medical provider.

PREGNANCY/BREASTFEEDING

Ella should not be used for people who are already pregnant because it will not work. Ella does **not** have any effect on a pregnancy already in place.

However, if you become pregnant despite taking Ella, there may be a higher risk of a tubal pregnancy. A tubal pregnancy is when the fertilized egg begins to grow in the fallopian tube, rather than the uterus, which can be dangerous for the pregnant person if not treated by a medical provider.

Ella should **not** be used by people who are breastfeeding.

THINGS TO KNOW

You are **not** protected from pregnancy if you have unprotected vaginal sex **after** using Ella/Emergency Contraception.

Ella/Emergency Contraception is not as effective as other methods of birth control.

Use condoms/barriers every time you have sex to help prevent sexually transmitted infections.

Ella does not prevent sexually transmitted infections.

GETTING STARTED

Get a prescription for Ella from a medical provider - the School Based Clinics can prescribe it at no-cost. Take the pill as soon as possible after unprotected vaginal sex. Until your next period, avoid vaginal sex or use condoms and/or prescribed birth control to prevent unplanned pregnancy. Follow up with your medical provider as instructed.

OTHER TYPES OF EMERGENCY CONTRACEPTION

Ella is available by prescription only, meaning you must see a medical provider to get this medication. If you cannot make it to a clinic, you can buy over-the-counter (without a prescription) Emergency Contraception pills, such as Plan B or Next Choice, at a convenience store or pharmacy. Over-thecounter Emergency Contraception pills are up to 89% effective if used within 72 hours (3 days) after unprotected vaginal sex and get less effective as time passes. Over-thecounter Emergency Contraception may be less effective for people above 165 pounds. If possible, those between 165-195 pounds, or those who had unprotected vaginal sex between 3-5 days ago, should get a prescription for Ella from a medical provider.

Certain IUDs can also be used as a form of emergency contraception if placed by a medical provider with 5 days of unprotected vaginal sex.
